

Introduction to Scentwork Seminar

This introduction to scent detection will cover the first steps in teaching your dog to find a target scent and communicate where it is to you. Learn how to work with your dog's scent superpower for fun at home or to enter competitions to test your abilities as a team.

Scent as an activity is easy to teach because for the dog it is a natural behaviour and requires very little equipment. Something to find, something to motivate your dog to find it and a desire to have fun with your dog is all that is needed. Every dog has the equipment to be successful and most get great benefits from scent work - building confidence, engaging their brain or just as an activity to build a more positive working relationship with you.

This workshop will show the basics of getting your dog to hunt out the odour of the Cedarwood essential oil used in DogsNZ scent competitions, but the same principles apply to any odour you want to use.

There are no audit spots or working spots like some seminars. Each attendee is equal to ask questions and participate. Many working spot seminars don't work out well for the dog handlers as they may miss out on the chance to move around and observe more dogs.

Although it is not necessary to bring your dog - you can attend without a dog and train at home - we will need a limited number of dogs to help demonstrate some exercises on the day. You can indicate on the registration form whether you would like your dog to be considered as a demonstrator on the day. If we have more dogs registered than we need on the day, we will select a variety of breeds and types from the registrations. The choice of dogs will be made to try to get a mix of sizes and breed types than rather just one type of dog on a first come basis first served basis.

Dogs attending must;

- Have good basic obedience (be able to focus on their handler and follow directions)
- Be able to cope with being on lead near other dogs
- Be comfortable crated or tethered during the lecture segments and while other dogs are working nearby
- Have something they will work to get a toy or food is fine but both is best. We will
 encourage using food in early stages for various reasons so try to find something tasty they
 will want but not lose their minds over.
